

#### Minutes of Regular Meeting January 18, 2001

The meeting was opened by Bob Hanson at 7:30 P.M. at the Pickens County Library. 15 members and 1 visitor were in attendance.

Former Stationmaster Curt Ehmann read the minutes of the December meeting and they were approved. Copies of the 2000 Annual Financial report were made available to the membership courtesy of Ralph Milz, former Paymaster. Disbursements for the year were \$2,078.65. Income totaled \$1,950.81. Cash on hand as of December 31, 2000 totaled \$5,078.32.

Dennis Moriarty announced March 1 as the next newsletter deadline. He needs articles.

Howard Garner gave an update on *TexilExpress* 2002. We have a signed contract with the Hyatt, but we're still working on a budget. It looks like we will be charging \$65.00 for registration (includes banquet and breakfast). The room rate is set at \$90.00. Steve Zonay and Howard have started an active ad campaign and are still looking for people to show home layouts and to do clinics. They are especially interested in finding someone to give a clinic entitled "After He's Gone" centering on how a layout whose owner has passed on should be disposed of.

Bob Hanson gave a report on the 2001 Train Show coming up very soon in February. Admission will be \$3.00. Curt Ehmann will be handling registration at the door, but he will need someone to spell him on occasion. An agenda for the show including set up and tear down was distributed. We have 26 tables reserved already and expect more in the days to come. The need for a club table was discussed. It was determined that we would need one for model display and one for CRM&HA hat and shirt sales. We may need another table depending on whether Bob Folsom still has items for sale. Allen Lohmann will be in charge of the Dining Car. Bob Hanson reminded us that we need to "leave a good taste" in U.A.G.'s mouth since this is our last show there and they will be most likely acting as a reference for next year as we search for a new host.

Howard Garner will be organizing home layout tours and making up maps for the Show. He will also be giving a workshop on sky and clouds and will try to get together an NMRA meeting. Howard volunteered Steve Zonay to do a workshop on bridges.

Flyers for the upcoming Train Show were available for distribution to help get the word out.

Richard Nichols mentioned that help is greatly needed on the HO modular layout.

Arlene Young is tentatively scheduled as our next speaker in February. Rob Seel will be speaking in March. We need speakers for April and May.

In the Rail fan Report, Michael Moore reported seeing a lot of leased Union Pacific power as well as a lot of M of W equipment on the Norfolk Southern Line in Greenville recently. Steve Zonay noted seeing a fresh repaint job—former Conrail (PRR) unit in NS black and white. Pickens Railway is reported to have shut down the line through Anderson due to heavy motorist traffic and congestion.

In Hobby News, the Coastal Rail Buffs club based in Savannah is reported to be doing quite well. In their twelfth year, their most recent show drew a crowd of around 1,200.

Mac McMillan reported that the South Carolina Railroad Museum has restructured their membership system. See him for details if interested.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:28 P.M. After a short break, Victor Hurst gave a highly informative and interesting talk on Railroads in New York City during the 1920s and '30s. Our next meeting will be at the Pickens County Library at 7:30 P.M. on February 15.

It was decided that we would have both the train show and the Convention next year. Everyone is asked to look for a new site for the train show.

Howard Garner, Chairman, reported that the display advertising the SER Convention 2002 was at our train show and that Howard and Steve Zonay are taking it to the Fair Hope Ala. Show on March 17<sup>th</sup>. It was reported that the site plan for the relocation of the Clemson RR station is complete and that the station will be moved soon.

It was also reported that the Seneca RR station is going to be repainted by the city. Rob Seel assisted the City of Seneca in selecting the colors. Rob advised them that wood stations of the era were painted green with yellow trim. The City is going to landscape the area around the station.

John Thorpe requested that articles and pictures be submitted for the Web Site.

Show attendees were treated to two how-to clinics: Howard Garner demonstrated sky and cloud painting techniques and Steve Zonay gave a talk on bridge and trestle building. Their service with a smile was greatly appreciated, especially by

# Inside/Out By Dennis Moriarty Colors

For me one of the most perplexing problems is selecting the color that I need for a part of the layout. What color should the buildings and houses be, the stations, sky, roads, grass, and even leaves. After deciding on the basic concept such as concrete or asphalt, summer/fall or winter colors. sky etc., the colors must be mixed to give the representation that is anticipated. This often takes much experimentation or requires the purchase of premixed paints or ground covers etc. I tend to use all of the above, but the majority of my painting projects start with flat white house paint. To this acrylic colors are added to blend the color that is wanted. If a large quantity of paint is required, such as a mountain scenery base coat, I have it mixed at the store. It takes a lot of experimenting. Wet paint that is mixed is usually lighter in color than when it is dry on the layout. Asphalt is not black, concrete is not white so it is fun to try to find a mixture that works properly. Experimentation is the only answer. I find that a little black and a little brown is needed for concrete and asphalt can be realistically represented with a black base coat rubbed with chalk powder to lighten it. "Dry brushing paint" can usually be mixed by adding lighter color paint to the base coat paint. Working a layout is not a science but an art. Everyone's layout is an expression of him or herself and color makes it even more difficult.


For another example, I was trying to paint a mountain extension up on the wall. My walls are drywall and prepainted in shades of blue, darker at the top and lighter at the bottom to represent sky.

The clouds were painted over the blue of course. I thought that I could use the same paint that I used for the base coat of my mountains painted over the blue to make the mountain appear larger. My base coat is a dark gray and when I painted the dark gray mountain on the dry blue sky it turned brown. I guess you have to be a trained artist to get the paint color correct the first time. Anyway don't be afraid to experiment. That is half the fun.

## Tip of the Month By Dennis Moriarty

Working with Hydrocal. Hydrocal sets up in five to 10 minutes, which makes it easy to build with, as the base is established rapidly. It also means that you can only mix a little at a time. I use paper towels dipped in a mixture of Hydrocal and water spread over crumpled paper to represent mountains. I find that putting the Hydrocal in a five gallon pail with a cover and setting it next to a five gallon pail partially filled with water makes the job go faster. I even put the two pails in an old wagon. I use an old cardboard box as a worktable as it is easy to move around and can be thrown away after it is messed up with spilled Hydrocal mixture. I mix in a plastic tub, the kind that are issued to patients in hospitals. It has high sides and is wider than the paper towels are long. I use two plastic small yellow "I Can't Believe its not Butter" containers. One in the Hydrocal and one in the water. I mix one to one putting in the Hyrocal in first and then the water. I mix as fast as possible with a 6-inch putty knife. The mixture is to wet at this point but the paper towels pull a lot of water out. First dip one towel into the mixture and push to one side. Then put and additional towel in and push to the other side. Insert a third towel and at this point the mixture is just right so apply to the layout. Next go back and apply the other two towels. There is now enough mixture for one more towel but it is to dry. Therefore, soak half the towel in water, dip into the remaining mixture and sop up as much as you can and apply this towel to the layout. Now you can repeat the procedure over and over until completed. After it is hard you

can smooth it out or rough it up with drywall compound, which sets slowly.
