



Also, people to break down and move the layout back to Central. I believe we can look forward to a small, but successful show. And I want to thank everyone in advance for their help.



Minutes - Meeting (Central Library) March 2, 2006

President Jim Reese called the meeting to order at 7:17PM with 15 members and no guests in attendance. The treasure's report indicated one expense (monthly rent for the storage unit) and income from several members having paid their annual dues.

. • **By-Laws** Bob Hanson's proposed revisions to the by-laws were read and discussed briefly. Discussion will be resumed after the complete text of the changes is published in the next news letter.

. • **Train Show** The details of the train show were discussed including the time (9AM3PM), signs, and the possibility of a clinic or exhibition (it was decided to have none due to lack of space).

• **Central Depot** The possibility of approaching a new town council about obtaining the Central depot was discussed. No action will be taken at this time.

• **Storage of the HO Layout** After presentation of details regarding the available space in Mrs. Rampey's basement, a motion was made and approved to move the layout from storage to this location. Included in this motion was a commitment by the club to install new

lighting, replace all the ceiling tiles, and

build a wall with a door to separate the space occupied by club equipment from the rest of the basement. It was informally agreed that the layout would be moved by the end of the month.

• **Westminster Depot** Upon recommendation and motion by Pete Sheriff, the club approved a donation of \$100 to the rebuilding of the Westminster depot.

The presentation was given by Dennis Moriarty on the construction of homemade crossing gate actuators.


. • **By-Laws** Discussion of the by-laws change was deferred until after the train show.










Startin g a Layout By Dennis Moriart

There are many things to consider before starting to build a model layout. Our hobby has so many different facets that maybe the hardest part is deciding what to do. It's like an artist with his brush facing a plank canvas. There is an abundance of things that he or she could paint. So it is with the model railroad. The following is not an attempt to present all the things that should be considered but is intended to help get the thinking process started when first planning a layout.

- 1. 1. Is the layout to be portable or in a fixed location?
- 2. 2. How much room is available?
- 3. 3. What type of construction will be required to support the layout.

4. 4. What scale will be selected. Z, N, and HO scales are small and more modeling can be placed in a smaller area. S, O, and G are large and require a lot of room.

- 5. 5. Will the layout be designed for prototypical operation or for display. It can be for both.
- 6. 6. Will the layout be for toy trains or model trains.
- 7. 7. Which railroad line are you going to model?
- 8. 8. What part of the railroad such as a city, country, mountain, desert, swamp, north, south, east coast, west coast, industrial or combination will be represented.
- 9. 9. What year are you going to represent.
- 10. 10. Is the railroad going to be prototypical or free lance.
- 11. 11. What season of the year will your layout represent.

12. 12. Are you going to draw your own track plans, or purchase drawings. There are a few good computer programs that can help you draw a good plan to fit your space.

13. 13. Certain areas of the country can be considered not only for its scenery but also for its railroad operation. Many railroads sometimes visit certain locations, which can give you several lines to run on your layout.

14. 14. Consider industries that your railroad could service, that interest you, such as

passenger service, freight, coal, lumber operation, grain elevators, cement plants, gravel pits, oil and refining, mining, coastal container ship service, iron ore, etc.

15. 15. Are you planning to lay your track by hand or purchase ready made. Many model engines and rolling stock have a minimum turning radius. Steam engines usually require more than diesel. This can effect the size of the layout.

16. 16. Will the layout be DCC or block wired?

17. 17. Consider the sequence of construction. For example, drop ceilings, lighting, wall painting (such as sky, clouds, backgrounds), floor

painting, or covering etc. should be done before the layout is started.

1. 18. Where are the towns, roads and hi-ways going to be?

2. 19. Do you plan rivers, or ravines for bridges? If so you may want to lower that section of the layout support system.

3. 20. Do you want the trains to go up and down grades or do you want to have a flat layout. Determine the maximum grade your train can go up.

4. 21. Will the layout be on two or more layers?

5. 22. Can you design the layout so that you can walk along the entire track area or will you have to duck under the layout to see the trains. G shaped layouts solve a lot of problems.

6. 23. Is the operation point to point or will it be in a circle or oval shape? In addition,

consider a dogbone shape or back and forth with return loops at the ends.

7. 24. Where are your yards going to go? Will you be able to enter a yard and exit the other end or will you have to back out? Will they be hidden or exposed.

8. 25. Remember this is your layout and you are the monarch of your little world.

This Month's Tips

When storing liquid adhesives such as glue, plastic pipe solvent etc. store the containers upside down. If the surface starts to congeal at least it will be away from the spout and also being upside down keeps any air from entering the container. You can keep containers with a pointed spout such as Gorilla Glue in an open top jar. The jar will keep the glue bottle from tipping over when resting on its point. Also, in the same vain glue or grout tubes made for grout guns have a long point on the dispenser end that can be plugged nicely with electrical connector nuts. Just pick the proper size nut for the tip.

After installing cork roadbed and before laying track, sand the top of the cork with a flat sanding block to remove any glue or irregularities.

When painting track with a spray gun or a brush, paint will get on the top of the track and if left there will not allow good electrical contact with the train wheels. To solve this problem cut several short pieces of 2x4 wood and slide the cut ends across the track before the paint dries. The wood fibers at the end of the 2x4 absorb large amounts of paint. Since the end is flat it slides evenly across the top of the track and removes all the paint on top of the track and does not disturb the paint on the side of the track. If the short 2x4 gets to much paint on its ends just throw it away and use a new clean one. The paint is difficult to remove after it dries and must be scraped or sanded off.
