The Greenville & Western Railway hosted the Greenville Chapter of the National Railway Historical Society's annual picnic. Their GP9 No. 3751 was built for the Baltimore & Ohio in 1957 as their No. 6513. It was later owned by the Port Terminal Railroad and the East Cooper & Berkeley Railroad, both as 6513 before purchase by the G&W in 2007. The G&W connects CSX in Pelzer to the Pickens Railroad in Belton, a distance of 12.74 miles over the former Piedmont & Northern.

MEETING MINUTES

5 January 2009 Regular Meeting Central Railway Museum

CEO Jim Reece called the meeting to order at 7:15PM. New members Harry Kelly and Frank James were introduced. Paymaster, Bob Folsom provided a treasurer's reported indicating \$1200 in currently outstanding checks. Anticipated expenditures include \$1600 for advertising, \$1000 for rent for the Bagwell Gymnasium, \$960 for table rental, and \$700 in change for the show. Mr. Folsom asked that those working on the train museum get prior authorization for any purchases.

Insurance

Glenn Nasworthy reported that adding business personal property insurance to our current liability plan would cost \$637 per year on top of the \$379 per year that we currently pay for liability coverage. This includes \$15000 worth of coverage with a \$500 deductible. Raising the deductible to \$1000 lowers the premium to \$605 per year. Either of these policies includes a rider for the portable layout, valued at \$5000. Richard Nichols asked if the policy included vandalism and if there was a discount for the alarm system. Mr. Nasworthy indicated that the insurer was aware of the alarm; the vandalism question was not answered definitively. In response to questions about the value of the building's content, Mr. Nasworthy said that the Heritage Insurance recommended taking pictures of the content of the building.

There was continued discussion of getting 100% NMRA membership to obtain coverage from their insurance, but at \$36 per person per year, the total bill for NMRA membership (about \$1152) would exceed the cost of the total package from our insurer (\$1016) and would provide us with only liability coverage. Mr. Nasworthy said that he thought that property insurance was available through NMRA at additional expense. At Bruce Gathman's suggestion, a poll was taken of the present members revealing that 6 out of 20 had current NMRA

membership. Mr. Nasworthy read some additional information about the limitations of NRMA liability coverage. Possibilities of contacting insurers that advertise layout insurance in the modeling magazines or the city's insurer were also proposed.

Mr. Folsom checked and found that our current insurance was due for renewal in July. Mr. Reece proposed that a committed study the matter. Mr. Nasworthy put forth a motion to purchase liability coverage from the current time through July from Heritage Insurance, while using the time until then to study the issue further. Mr. Gathman seconded the motion and it passed without opposition.

Central Railway Festival

Ron Keith reported the arrangements for the Central Railway Festival, a joint venture with the Central Area Business Council and Clemson Area Chamber of Commerce. The festival now has about a \$10,000 budget. A lot of ideas, such as getting an NS unit on display, have been brought up, but Mr. Keith thought that many may be too late for implementation this year. SC DOT has approved blocking Hwy 93 from Watkins St. to Church St. on Friday night, allowing traffic to divert to Werner St. On Saturday, Hwy 93 will be blocked on a larger section from Bank St. to Pepper St. An ADA waver has been obtained for the caboose and the city has agreed to make the exterior modifications to the museum to make it ADA compliant.

We will have a small train show in a main street building as part of the festival, including the portable layout, Thomas activities, and limited dealer space in the basement and second floor of the building. Hours will be 6-10PM on Friday and 9AM-3PM on Saturday. Dale Reynolds expressed concern regarding drunken people in the museum and having to keep the layout running on Friday night.

Mr. Keith indicated that we are responsible for staffing the caboose with a docent, but that other activities outside the museum and train show would be the responsibility of other entities. The fire department will bring a truck. The committee is working on a clown and a "hobo" comedian. It is planned to rent a train ride from Greenville for the weekend for \$500 to run in the parking lot. Pancho's, Villa Novella, and Mainstreet Deli plan to sell food. Others will sell beer and wine. Mr. Reece suggested that Mac McMillin bring a motorcar for display.

501.c3 Status.

Former treasurer Howard Garner said that the IRS has requested more information on our application for 501.c3 status. First of all, the IRS needs approval from the club to continue working with him since he is no longer treasurer. Mr. Keith made and Mr. Gathman seconded a motion to grant Howard Garner authority to continue representing the club in dealing with the IRS. This motion was passed unanimously. The specific questions from the IRS regarded the nature of the merger with the "Inc." organization, a topic on which they requested more documentation. They also need some form of assurance that all donations from CRM&HA will be to 501.c3 organizations. Mr. d'Entremont asked if this would preclude paying other clubs for services, such as bringing a layout to a show, and Mr. Garner replied that he thought this would still remain acceptable.

Portable Layout

Jim McInnis reported that Rob Seel's work on the backdrops had been outstanding and that the inside and outside of the layout framework had been repainted. There is now a logging line in the corner of the layout where Mt. Moriarty used to be and a 5 track staging yard on the inside of the loop. Buildings of different types have been recently added and a system for transporting and storing the layout has been arranged. The layout will be trailered after the show and stored in Mr. Nasworthy's motorhome barn. There was discussion as to painting a logo or lettering on the trailer. However, nobody had prepared a proposal. Mr. d'Entremont suggested tabling this issue until after the train show and festival.

Central Railway Museum

Material costs of \$456 for building renovations were reported to the city this month. The city has responded to our request for a phone line, saying that they are not interested in paying for this service. The locks have been changed on the exterior doors and new ones installed on doors between the exhibit spaces and the meeting room and kitchen. Club members will need to come in the front door and will have keys to this and the interior doors. Their alarm codes will deactivate the entire system from the pad at the front door. Representatives of the city will be given keys to the back door and alarm codes for only the meeting room and kitchen.

Mr. Folsom said that the kitchen and bathroom renovations were moving along. Fiberglass-backed vinyl flooring will cost \$1254, installed, which is reimbursable by the city. A motion to have this floor installed passed unanimously. We need to work in the storage area, install cabinets in the kitchen, and have an additional

electrical circuit to run. There was continued discussion of blocking the windows or reinforcing them with polycarbonate. We need more information about the weathering and price of this material and also need to consider how to mount is appropriately before we can proceed with a decision on this.

Mac McMillin reported that the American Flyer loop in the Heritage room is running and that the Lionel O-gauge is getting set up. We will also have a loop of standard gauge, running a train acquired by Dennis Moriarty during WWII. This train has been estimated to been manufactured in 1931 or 1932.

In lieu of a program, there was a detailed discussion of logistics for the train show. Notable developments include Bruce Gathman indicating 5-6 people would bring live steam to operate for most of the show and Steve Zonay reporting that 112 tables had already been sold, compared to 74 total last year. There was brief discussion of donation acceptance policy. Mac McMillin said that the club should not accept any donations with conditions attached. Mr. Gathman concurred and said that this was "standard museum policy". There was no opposition to these suggestions, but neither was a formal policy made.

And Mac McMilllin will station his motor car next the caboose and explain to the public the role these two pieces of equipment played on the railroad.

There have been times when I have, and probably some of you have felt like the club was taking on to much. The group of people that make up the membership of CRM&HA have proven that wrong. Members have always been ready to step up and take a leadership role or show up consistently for work sessions. With the older members getting things started and the new member supplying new ideas and energy the past years have been a real success. THANKS TO ALL.




CENTRAL CROSSINGS, the CRMHA Newsletter

The owner is a Mr. Scott Morehead, who lives in Charleston SC. He is a Corvair collector, has "over a hundred of them", and is Vice President of CORSA - the Corvair fan club. He purchased the three cars from two ladies who had converted one into an efficiency apartment, and another into a bedroom with dry wall and carpet and such. The L&N is still in somewhat original condition. It has roller bearing trucks and is generator equipped. There are still some railroad work forms and equipment inside. It is for sale, on Craig's List. At one point a historian researching the L&N RR was interested in this particular caboose. He brought them here two years ago and is searching for a diner car to turn the whole thing into a BBQ restaurant. [I told him about a friend of mine in Florida who did the exact same thing. He also used the depot as an ice cream parlor.] The moving and set up was handled by a gentleman named Rocky Holyfield (sp?) from North Carolina who is accumulating cars and memorabilia for a train museum location unsure, maybe Dillsboro or Bryson city?.
