GENERAL MEETING MINUTES

January 7, 2010

Regular Meeting at the Central Railway Museum

Meeting was called to order by President Jim Reece at 7:15 PM

The meeting began with everyone singing *Happy Birthday* to Howard Garner.

Two guests were introduced by Glenn Nasworthy: Ette Ruppert and Jack Green.

The Treasurer reported we had \$5,700 on December 31, 2009, but thanks to income from table rental for the Train Show we now have \$7,500.00 in our account.

The President reported:

- 1) That we had no invoices for the months of October and November for City reimbursement. He asked that invoices for December be turned in to him.
- 2) We have received permission from the City to use their copyrighted logo on shirts, etc.
- 3) The City will be modifying the lease to include our having the old kitchen. He pointed out that we will need it for storage for about a year.
- 4) Some chairmen still need to turn in committee member lists. Only one committee has reported any written "how to" standards.
- 5) That Brian's IRS publication e-mail provides guide lines for valuing donations. It was pointed out by Bruce Gathman that we don't determine values, that that is the donor responsibility.
- 6) The Travelers Rest History Society has asked us to present a program on February 16, 2010. Bob Folsom and Jim Reece have volunteered to do a slide show for them.

In reference to No.3 above, Jim Selton outlined some plans for partial remodeling by removing the wall and replacing of the floor. There were various discussions about this and it was decided the partial work could be done and the rest of the project could be discussed later.

Jim Reece is writing a letter to Blue Ridge Hobbies asking for help in getting a Tie and Plank Mill donation

for the club. Jim asked for a list of additional needed items for the layout.

Rob Seel pointed out that articles for the next newsletter need to be in two weeks after this meeting.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

<u>Museum Building</u>: Glenn asked that those working on the layout please use drop cloths when doing anything that could stain the carpet. There are some in the old kitchen closet.

Annual Train Show: Bruce said we are having good reservations for tables. He pointed out that we are going to need a lot of help to man the show and asked anyone who can help to see Ron Keith. Wives are welcome to help. Jim Selton is to run the Company Store. Bruce explained that we are to make an envelope for each item we want to sell showing the price requested. People are to put the money in the envelope and turn into the Information Table. Keep the prices in whole numbers as there is no provision for making change. Advertising will be similar to last year. Tables will be delivered February 26 at 10:00 AM and must be set up. The SC Transportation Museum is bringing their motorcar and Mac is bringing his.

Central Railroad Festival: Ron Keith reported the committee has lined up cloggers, 2 "ride on" trains, a hayride, music, and is working to lineup Cat Bus service to transport people to Collins Ole Towne, Freedom Hill and the Central History Museum.

<u>Portable Layout</u>: Jim McInnis reported we need to start Monday night work sessions on the 18th to get the layout ready for the show.

<u>American Flyer Room</u>: Dale Reynolds reported they are searching for some items and will be willing to trade excess they have for wanted items.

<u>Monthly Programs</u>: Dale Reynolds said that Mac McMillin will have the February program. He needs programs for the following months.

<u>Museum Curator</u>: Jim Selton reported he has received a donation of a complete table setting of Atlantic Coast Line dining car china from a couple in Asheville. He is still looking for more stock certificates. He asked if we wanted to buy a sign from a British Railroad. The club said no.

<u>Web Master</u>: Ed Welch reported he is working on downloadable form and is looking at a swapshop.

<u>HO Layout</u>: Track Work: Bob Folsom said the upper level continuous run is up and going.

<u>**HO Layout: Scenery : Sandy Eustis reported that the upper level terrain is the top priority.**</u>

Bruce reported that we have received a large donation of G-gauge to have when we start our outdoor railway.


Members were reminded that dues are due for 2010.

UPDATES FROM THE RMS ARCHITECTURE MODEL SHOPS 30,000 gal ETHANOL TANK CAR

Many of you know that, in addition to my hobby activities, I also occasionally do custom model work. I've done custom painting, decaling, and craftsman kit assembly for fellow members, as well as for commercial clients. I am pleased to announce the completion of my most recent commission: a 30,000-gallon ethanol tank car for Lincoln Energy Solutions in Greenville, SC A group of employees thought an HO-scale model custom decorated would make a special gift for the company's owner, and they asked me to do the work upon referral from the Greenville & Western Railroad's Steven Hawkins.

Lincoln Energy Solutions is an ethanol processor and one of the G&W's clients. They do not own any cars of their own, so this was going to be a prototype, original design. They already had a company logo, and that provided the basis for design and color. The logo, however, came to me as a low-resolution image file. I had to redraw the logo with my AutoCad program, along with all of the other standard markings and data for current-day ethanol tanks. Then, I imported my drawing into PhotoShop, where I color matched my graphics to the logo.

Before I began work on the model I produced a colored drawing depicting black-painted and white-painted cars with logos and markings for my client to review. Fortunately, since I print decals in-house with a 4-color inkjet printer, the white-painted car was preferred. That meant I could print the decals onto clear decal film and the decals would appear true-to-color as the white paint

on the model shows through the translucent image color. Paint colors other than white require an opaque background on decals, which means I usually have to outsource those -- unless the model is for a second-hand, black-out paint scheme, like I did for Dale Reynolds' Clinchfield Coal SW-1.

The production-run Athearn model came with photo-etched metal platforms, metal wheels, and double-shelf couplers. No undecorated models were available, so I had to strip the factory paint and markings with 91% isopropyl alcohol. I used

an aluminum foil pan as a "body bath" for the car, and, with light scrubbing of an old toothbrush, the paint was stripped in one evening.

Once the paint was stripped I washed the car parts in soapy water and set it out to dry on a paper towel. Once it was dry, I sprayed the car with PolyScale Reefer White and printed the decals. The came the tough part: color matching the yellow paint for the spill band to the company logo. After sampling every yellow paint color I had on hand, I ended up purchasing a bottle of TTX Yellow.

I masked off the spill band using regular Scotch tape, since it has a nice, clean edge and is usually kind to release itself from what's beneath it. I also wrapped the ends of the car in clean, white printer paper for large-scale masking. I sprayed the car again with Reefer White to make sure the edges of the tape were sealed. If any color were to bleed beneath onto the white, I'd prefer it be the same color! One the white was dry, I sprayed the TTX Yellow.

Upon removal of the tape and paper something did not look right. The paint job was beautifully done, but when I compared the colors to the decals I determined that TTX yellow was too bright. I experimented again, and found that my old bottle of Floquill Railbox Rellow was a better match. And so, I masked the car off all over again, applied the Railbox Yellow, and the results were much better.

Before I could apply the decals I had to seal them with a clear fixative spray. The decal film I used was from a Testor's do-it-yourself decal kit, so I used the fixative they supplied to play it safe. I sprayed the car with a clear gloss coat, and from then on, I worked with my usual decaling method. I wet the model surface with either Testor's Decal Set or MicroSet. Once the decal is in position and dried, I brush MicroSol over the surface and along the edges.

The decals shriveled up like prunes as the MicroSol did its work. But not to worry, the decals settled down flat after a couple of hours. I then applied MicroSol a second time. Finally, once all of the decals had set, I sprayed the car again with a light gloss coat.

By the time we have our meeting next week the car will have been delivered, along with a clear, acrylic display case and wood base. My client seems to be very pleased, and there is the possibility for producing more of these cars. Of course, if I did more I'd print decals with different car numbers so that each car would be truly unique. The car number, by the way, was derived from the company's name and Greenville zip code: LESX 296010.

Next up in the Shop: An S-scale watermelon boxcar and then a pair of 70-ton switchers for Dale. Stay tuned!



In order to recreate accurate data markings (**above**) I took a drive to photograph some cars on a storage track along a public road near Honea Path, SC (**below**).





Where Can Ya Get Hydrocal 'Round Here?

I ran across the receipt from when I last purchased Hydrocal plaster for my layout. At least twice in the past year someone has asked where to purchase it. I called and they still carry 100 pound bags for \$42.60. This is way cheaper than buying it in 1/2 gallon milk cartons at hobby shops.

Since Hydrocal plaster goes on very thin because it is so strong, 100 pounds is enough to do most layouts. At home I pour it out of the bag and store it in 5 gallon buckets until it is used and while it is used. I mix it 50/50 with water, dip paper towels in the mixture and drape over irregular shapes such a crushed newspaper. After it sets (about 5 minutes) I finish off with drywall compound. Since it sets up so fast I only mix about a cup of Hydrocal and a cup of water at a time. The mixture is wet at first but the paper towels are thirsty and remove much of the moisture. That is why I put two towels in at first and then one at a time. They have a web site but it doesn't have much information.


PICKENS RAILROAD DAY TRIP FROM BELTON TO HONEA PATH, SC

Back on January 5, 2010 I took a drive to Belton to do some photographic research on ethanol tank cars. I also was hoping to catch some action on the Pickens Railroad, since all of their freight operations are between Lower Anderson (Gluck / Homeland Park) and Honea Path. So, to see as much of the route as I could I drove to Anderson first, and then on into Belton via US Hwy 76 & 178. I was not disappointed; I caught up with this little train just west of Belton, entering town. And, since track speeds are considerably slow on this NS branch line that the Pickens leases I was able to position myself in plenty of time for good shots! Besides the photos on the front page, we have these.







Top: PICK 9508, seen from Hwys 76 &178 has pulled its single car through Belton and is about to enter the location known as Docheno, located halfway between Belton and Honea Path. Middle right: At Docheno, the Pickens occupies an open field for service and storage of many interesting things, such as U-18B No. 9507 (ex-CSX MoW No. 9507, nee-SCL No. 351), which has been relegated to "organ donor" status. Near the end of the line, everything is clearly visible from a county road and it presents a neat modeling idea. The "main line" track is in the foreground, and a small yard office is out of the picture to the right. Left: Also at Docheno is Alco S1, No. 6, still wearing her faded Pickens blue and stored inoperable. If anyone knows the history of No. 6, please speak up!
