NATIONAL MRR MONTH





HO Division has enjoyed a very active autumn with street festivals in Central and Westminster. Group participation has been encouraging--thanks to all who helped, especially to our non-division club members helping in the effort! Public participation was excellent, due in part to beautiful weather, good exposure, and all-around enthusiasm.

The layout traveled well and ran remarkably well for the two days in Central and the two days in Westminster. The left-hand turnout at the Yard exit was successfully replaced, a ground throw was installed at the passenger station, and the overall condition of the track remains rather good. Ironically, horn-hook couplers experienced fewer mishaps than Kadees--go figure! Other highlights included Pat Hogue's Triple Crown, Steve Zonay's PRR mail train, Howard Garner's Cascade reefers, Ed Painter's thousand-car N&W coal drag, John Thorpe's British trains, and Rob Seel's PRR and B&O Limiteds.

Howard has also been busy adding various details to Garner's Corner (or as we call it, Howard's End). In fact, several people at both festivals inquired, "What town is that?"--"Garner's Corner."--"Oh! Where is that?"--"Right here, ma'am. Really, no kidding!"

A new idea is brewing for the scenicking of the four unfinished sections. A modular scenery concept is being developed by Dennis Moriarty, Curt Ehmann, and Pat Hogue. The idea involves drop-in landscaping that can be crafted at home, transported separately from the track top, and dropped into any open space. Stay tuned for the results!

The biggest work order on the list, however, is replacing the T-bolts on the legs with wing nuts and replacing a broken leg or two.

N-SCALE NEWS

A combined effort with the Asheville N-scalers (two 4 foot corners and four 4 foot modules) and two of our 3 foot corners provided a respectable N-scale layout for the Central Railroad Festival. Even though we had never hooked up with them before, the modules went together perfectly and trains ran both days with little, or no problems. This speaks well for our N-scale

standards, and the workmanship of both clubs. We are looking forward to joining with the Asheville club, and others, in the future.

Our project layout (approximately 4' x 7') is still in the planning stages, although we have tentatively selected Lou Sassi's Mohawk Division layout, which provides two loops for constant running, interesting scenery, including a town, mountain, river, and a couple of bridges. The layout has some switching which we plan to enhance by including John Allen's switching puzzle to increase operational interest. We hope to get into the actual construction in the near future and have promised a completion for sometime in 1997. All N-scalers will be invited to participate to give everyone a chance at getting hands-on experience.

Meanwhile, we are still urging all N-scalers to consider building an N-Trak module, or an additional module if you already have one. If you attended the recent Greenberg Show in Atlanta you might have noticed the two N-Trak layouts displayed there. Scenery-wise, our layout compares favorably, but we do need more than our present 9-10 modules. Two events are coming up next year that we will participate in-our show on March 15th, and the Asheville Show in May on Memorial Day weekend. Please plan to attend both of these events with your modules. If you have any changes or improvements to make on them, now is a good time to start.

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

PROGRAM NOTES

In September we were presented with a slide show by author Kirt Reisweber, which focused on trains past and present that went through Richmond, VA. It was surprising to me to learn just how much of the trackage runs above ground level. It was an interesting program. Thank you Kirt.

In October Howard Garner gave the first presentation of the clinic he is developing on the subject of awnings. Although all of us see awnings on buildings every day we do not realize just how prevalent they are. Thanks Howard for bringing this often overlooked detail in modeling buildings to our attention. It was a good clinic!



NOVEMBER MEETING

For our November program Dennis Moriarty will explain and demonstrate "Current Sensor Control of Trains and Accessories." Most model train control systems use the location of one or more of the trains to automatically activate other functions. Such as: automatically starting or stopping other trains at sidings, crossings, stations, or by overtaking trains on ovals, etc.; activation of road crossing gates; activation of sound systems; activation of other accessories; automation of the main line leaving more time to manually operate yards, sidings, etc.

Some methods commonly used to locate the trains: photocell light detectors, reed switches buried between the tracks with magnets on the engines and cars, computer control systems, feeler wires and micro switches. The above methods all have common problems: they all require a lot of extra wire to be run out under the layout; they can be expensive; some like feeler wires can cause derailments; reed switches require magnets on the trains.

The advantages of the current sensor approach: The system uses existing wires to the track blocks so it doesn't require any extra wires except to accessories (Dennis hates crawling under to add more wires); the entire control system can be located at the cab; it is simple to use and work with once you understand how it works; it doesn't require knowledge of electrical chips (although they can be used if desired); parts and other materials are inexpensive and easy to obtain at local stores; it is very flexible; it can provide light indication on the system map to tell which blocks are occupied.

What is a current sensor control and how does it work? Come to the November meeting and find out.
